Herts St Juliaan Memorial

While on our last battlefield tour in September we had the opportunity to once again visit the memorial we erected in 2017. That was the second largest group from Hertfordshire to be on that spot since the Hertfordshire Regiment attacked on 31st July 1917 – obviously the next largest is when we unveiled the memorial on that date in 2017. *More information*. It was really pleasing to see that a wreath was already in place, obviously laid earlier in the year, before we laid ours. I must admit to feeling very proud. Overall it is still in great condition, but I did notice a couple of (very) minor issues. So I hope to visit again next spring with a tube of sealant.

Help The Project?

We would always encourage people to get involved, especially at the talks, photographing memorials or in some element of the research. Some of the latter can be done with just access to the Commonwealth

War Graves Commission website, which is free, or you could simply add information from newspaper cuttings. If you have access to Ancestry or FindMyPast then much more can be done. We can tailor tasks to your experience or time available, and any help needed would be given. An example of one of the simpler tasks would be just adding a man's medal allocation to his biography. Research Report

Without getting online I am struggling to analyse progress, but I can say that all of our longstanding researchers continue to provide outstanding contributions to our project (if you would like to join them and do a little research (or a lot!) please contact Jonty Wild.

Using a fairly recent download, I can give the following information, which I believe represents more great steps forward.

Totals:

We are now researching an estimated 12,668 Hertfordshire related individuals. We roughly grade the quality of the biographies 0 to 5. These grades represent:

- 0. No biography (yet), i.e. name only and no information from CWGC or
- Basic biography, e.g. CWGC information only, but man uniquely identified.
- 2. Better than 1, but could easily be improved, e.g. by adding research.
- 3. Good biography, but can probably be improved further, relatively easily (but not always).
- 4. Very good biography.
- 5. An excellent biography.

Grades 3 or 4 is what we aim for. In July 2024 we only had 6,069 graded, now I can report:

Images

We are keen to include a personalised image to as many of the biographies as possible. In order of preference that is usually: 1) a photograph of the person, 2) their headstone or name on their memorial abroad, 3) a UK headstone (often an inscription on a family grave), 4) a related newspaper cutting. We (Paul Johnson, Stuart Osborne and I) spent a lot of time, while abroad, photographing headstones and this, along with the contributions from many individuals, means that 3,668 (29%) now have a personalised image, which is excellent, but of with progress this task does get harder.

Hertfordshire Memorial Coverage & Research

We know of about 1,020 memorials in Hertfordshire – there are probably more - we have looked at 862, the rest probably lack a photograph. The following figures are rough, but I will work on improving them. Of the 12,668 men we have in our database, about 2,614 do not seem to be memorialised in Hertfordshire at all. The other 10,054 are recorded in 5,911 locations – this probably needs more explanation, so here goes:

Fairly obviously, it is common for individuals to appear on several memorials in a location, e.g. the village memorial and maybe the church and school memorials, etc. and the above numbers do not reflect this. What is perhaps less understood in that it is common for individuals to appear in different locations. So, the 10,054 men are on at least one memorial in a Hertfordshire location. The following table breaks this down, which even if inaccurate at this stage, I find fascinating – remember these are locations not memorials.

At least 1 memorial in 1 Herts location	4,143	32.70%
In 2 locations	3,951	31.20%
In 3 locations	1,422	11.20%
In 4 locations	424	3.30%
In 5 locations	104	0.80%
In 6 locations	7	>1% (0.06%)
In 7 locations	3	>0.5% (0.02%)
On no memorial in any Herts location	2614	21%

We also believe that we have identified 1,539 men who are memorialised but who also have a connection to another Herts location where they are not, e.g. they were born there but are not on one of its memorials.

Some gratifying correspondence the Project had received, thanks to our researchers:
